# New Book Gets Real About **Grandparenting For Baby Boomers**Shocked Into Wondering What It's All About

- Ideas for playing, creating rituals, storytelling and more with grandkids
- Grandparenting at a distance, taking advantage of webcams, cross-generational holiday trips and cell phones
- Dealing with a grandchild's misbehavior, sibling rivalry, family deaths or your own disability

Woven through all the stories and advice are lines from songs Baby Boomers will happily remember from the rock-n-roll years, such as "Shake, Rattle and Roll," "Purple People Eaters," "Ninety-six Tears" and "Let It Be." "When Dylan and I drive together, the car is our Carnegie Hall on wheels," says Burns. "At a stoplight, we're the people you see in the car next to you with our heads bobbing and our lips moving. Everyone should make music with their grandkids, and for that, rock-n-roll era songs can't be beat."

# All About Rock-n-Roll Generation Grandparents: Grandparents Rock

### **FACT SHEET**

- \* Grandparents Abound: According to the California-based research company Age Wave Communications, in 2000 there were 69 million grandparents in the U.S., with that number expected to grow to 80 million in 2010.
- \* Grandparents Connect: In a 2001 AARP study, 68% of grandparents said they see a grandchild every one or two weeks. Only 8% see a grandchild less frequently than every few months.
- \* Grandparents Play: More than half of grandparents in the AARP survey had exercised or played sports with their grandchildren in the previous six months. This was true for every age range of grandparents surveyed, not only the younger ones.
- \* Grandparents Interact: The five most popular activities that grandparents reported in the AARP survey doing with their grandchildren were: having them over for dinner, going out to dinner with them, watching TV together, going shopping and reading to them.
- \* Grandparents Babysit: A study reported in *The Gerontologist* in 2001 found that 24% of grandparents watch one or more grandchildren between 10 and 29 hours a week. About 7% perform childcare more than 30 hours a week.
- \* Grandparents Contribute: In 2000, Mercury Funds reported that 59% of grandparents surveyed expected their savings and investments to be important in paying for their grandchildren's college costs.
- \* Grandparents Matter: According to The Legacy Project, 9 out of 10 adult grandchildren feel their grandparents influenced their values and behaviors.
- \* Grandparents Spend: On average, grandparents spend \$500 on their grandchildren annually, according to the AARP study.



# of Grandparents Rock: The Grandparenting Guide for the Rock-n-Roll Generation by Pat Burns

"I won't grow up." It's a timeless refrain, going back at least as far as Peter Pan. But it has special resonance for Baby Boomers, particularly those who became young adults during the Hippie and Vietnam War eras. Yet now many of those flower children and protesters have become grandparents. Yikes!

Advice on coping with the unexpected status of being a grandparent is at hand in a new book, *Grandparents Rock: The Grandparenting Guide for the Rock-n-Roll Generation* by Pat Burns. The contents go far beyond celebrating the joys of grandparenting and suggestions for how not to bore everyone around you by constantly bragging about the grandkids and showing their photos to perfect strangers.

Burns and other contributors discuss the challenges of being a grandparent, including today's complicated stepfamilies, adoptions, teen pregnancies and premature births, along with ideas for bonding through play, songs, rituals and travel with grandkids of different ages.

The book also offers interesting methods of maintaining relationships with distant grandchildren, such as using webcams and scheduling regular phone calls at the time most convenient for the faraway family members.

The text is colorful, the writing is upbeat and many of the stories are memorable. Especially inviting for anyone in the rock-n-roll generation are the chapter titles drawn from sixties and seventies songs, like "Nine-ty-six Tears" and "Happy Together." The book makes a great gift for any prospective or actual grandmother or grandfather who has ever had any kind of issues with the idea of fully growing up.
